Western Australia (WA) End-year 2024

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Introduction and Background

The Western Australia (WA) - Training and Assessment report is a snapshot overview of data and outlines the most recent numbers for:

- Enrolments
- Trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates (SIMG)
- Assessment pass rates
- New RANZCP Fellows
- Certificates of advanced training

The end-of-year update data is current as of March 2025 and summarises activities for January – December 2024.

Importantly, the data published in the respective sections are aggregated for each state and Western Australia. However, the definition of location changes according to the member type:

- Trainees: The Fellowship zone is used to determine location
- SIMGs: The employer state is used to determine location.
- New Fellows: The last Fellowship zone recorded is used to determine location

The data for this report is taken from the College member database, and the Education and Training Unit conducted the analysis as part of its regular reporting of the College's education activities. Numbers may differ from other reports due to trainees moving zones, late form submissions, withdrawals, non-payment of fees, exclusions, or other reasons. Results presented in this report have been rounded to the nearest whole per cent, and in some cases, answers may not add up to 100%.

1. RANZCP Fellowship program enrolment

During the 2024 training year, a total of 33 trainees commenced the WA training program (see Table 1).

The training year for 2024 commenced in February for Australia and Western Australia, covering the period from February 2024 to February 2025. Table 1 compares the 2024 intake with the same period in 2023 and shows the difference in numbers.




Figure 1. WA Training intake (2013-2024)

2. RANZCP Fellowship program numbers

Overall, the WA program currently has 201 active trainees. The distribution of these trainees across different stages of training is detailed in Table 2. There are 197 trainees (98%) undertaking the 2012 program, and four trainees (2%) transitioned from the 2003 program.




Figure 2. Trainees by Fellowship Zone and Stage of Training (correct as of 8 January 2024)

Figure 2 illustrates the distribution of WA trainees across each stage of training and zone. The WA program has the highest proportion of its trainees in stage 2.

The distribution of WA trainees by zone and gender is outlined in Table 3. Women represent more than 50% of WA trainees. In Table 3, trainees identifying as non-binary / gender diverse and preferring not to say are presented as part of the overall numbers and not distributed by zone. Table 4 shows the range and frequency of the age of WA trainees. The WA trainees range from 26 to 70 years of age. The average age is 37.93 years, with a standard deviation of +/-7.813 years.

3. Assessments

3.1 Multiple Choice Question (MCQ) Examination

The Multiple-Choice Question (MCQ) Examination was held in March and August 2024. The pass rates for the WA program were 70% in March and 67% in August. In total, 29 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.2 Critical Essay Question (CEQ) Examination

The Critical Essay Question Examination (CEQ) was held in February and August 2024, where the WA program achieved a pass rate of 65% in February and 39% in August. A total of 49 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.3 Modified Essay Question (MEQ) Examination

The Modified Essay Question Examination (MEQ) was held in February and August 2024. The WA program pass rates were 61% in February and 50% in August. A total of 58 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.4 Clinical Competency Assessment (CCA)

The Board has approved the implementation of the Clinical Competency Assessment—Modified Portfolio Review (CCA-MPR), which will be offered from April 2024 to April 2026 as the primary clinical assessment for the RANZCP Fellowship.

The CCA-MPR was held in March and September 2024, with the WA program achieving a 66% pass rate in March and a 92% pass rate in September. A total of 19 assessments were completed during these rounds in 2024. The CCA relies on longitudinal data points to make high-stakes decisions, unlike summative assessments, which base judgments on a single data point. The ongoing, structured feedback received during training is assessed to inform progression decisions. This ensures that candidates only proceed to submit their portfolios when they believe they have met the required standards. As a result, the outcomes from the CCA do not come as a surprise to candidates.

3.5 Psychotherapy Written Case (PWC)

The results of the Psychotherapy Written Case (PWC) submissions received in 2024 are summarised in Tables 13 to 16, including the pass rates. In total, 30 submissions were assessed. The pass rates for the PWC in 2024 were as follows: 67% in February, 40% in May, 91% in August and 64% in November 2024.

8. Specialist Training Program (STP)

The Specialist Training Program (STP) is an Australian Government initiative.

It provides funding to health organisations to support specialist medical training in settings beyond traditional public teaching hospitals. STP posts involve 6-month training rotations in priority settings, such as the private sector, regional, rural, and remote areas, as well as non-hospital settings (e.g., aged care, community health organisations, or Aboriginal medical services). As providers of STP, posts must submit a report after each rotation. The numbers in this report may differ from those reported to the Department of Health and Aged Care. The Modified Monash (MM) classification is used to report the geographical location of the posts.

Table 35 shows the total number of FTE by the MM rating, and the number of WA trainees in the STP program is shown in Table 36. The STP program funded a total of 14 FTE in MM locations during Rotation 1, 2024, covering 10 trainees.

9. Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) Program

The Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) program is an Australian Government initiative designed to increase the number of psychiatry trainees and specialists in rural and regional areas.

Training posts funded in the IRTP program differ from those in the Specialist Training Program (STP) in that the funding follows the trainee through multiple rotations at a health service.

Overall, the College has 36 active trainees funded by the IRTP program. Currently, there are four trainees from WA funded by the IRTP.
