Introduction and Background

The Queensland (QLD) - Training and Assessment report is a snapshot overview of data and outlines the most recent numbers for:

- Enrolments
- Trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates (SIMG)
- Assessment pass rates
- New RANZCP Fellows
- Certificates of advanced training
- Specialist Training Program (STP) and Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) Program.

The end-of-year update data is current as of March 2025 and summarises activities for January – December 2024.

Importantly, the data published in the respective sections is aggregated for each state and New Zealand. However, the definition of location changes according to the member type:

- Trainees: The Fellowship zone is used to determine location
- SIMGs: The employer state is used to determine location
- New Fellows: The last Fellowship zone recorded is used to determine location

The data for this report is taken from the College member database, and the Education and Training Unit conducted the analysis as part of its regular reporting of the College's education activities. Numbers may differ from other reports due to trainees moving zones, late form submissions, withdrawals, non-payment of fees, exclusions, or other reasons. Results presented in this report have been rounded up to the nearest whole per cent, and in some cases, answers may not add up to 100%.

1. RANZCP Fellowship program enrolment

During the 2024 training year, a total of 97 trainees commenced the QLD training program (see Table 1).

The training year for 2024 commenced in February for Australia and New Zealand, covering the period from February 2024 to February 2025. Table 1 compares the 2024 intake with the same period in 2023 and shows the difference in numbers.




Figure 1. QLD Training intake (2013-2024)

2. RANZCP Fellowship program numbers

Overall, the QLD program currently has 488 active trainees undertaking the 2012 program. The distribution of these trainees across different stages of training is detailed in Table 2.




Figure 2. Trainees by Fellowship Zone and Stage of Training (correct as of 8 January 2024)

Figure 2 illustrates the distribution of trainees across each stage of training and the location. The QLD program has the highest proportion of its trainees in stages 2 and 3.

The distribution of QLD trainees by gender is outlined in Table 3. Women represent around 50% of QLD trainees. In Table 3, trainees identifying as non-binary / gender diverse and preferring not to say are presented as part of the overall numbers and not distributed by program. Table 4 shows the range and frequency of the age of QLD trainees. The QLD trainees range from 25 to 65 years of age. The average age is 35.25 years, with a standard deviation of +/-6.920 years.

3. Assessments

3.1 Multiple Choice Question (MCQ) Examination

The Multiple-Choice Question (MCQ) Examination was held in March and August 2024. The pass rates for the QLD program were 57% in March and 84% in September. In total, 92 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.2 Critical Essay Question (CEQ) Examination

The Critical Essay Question Examination (CEQ) was held in February and August 2024, where the QLD program achieved a pass rate of 70% in February and 59% in August. A total of 81 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.3 Modified Essay Question (MEQ) Examination

The Modified Essay Question Examination (MEQ) was held in February and August 2024. The QLD program pass rates were 59% in February and 57% in August. A total of 116 assessments were completed during both rounds in 2024.

3.4 Clinical Competency Assessment (CCA)

The Board has approved the implementation of the Clinical Competency Assessment—Modified Portfolio Review (CCA-MPR), which will be offered from April 2024 to April 2026 as the primary clinical assessment for the RANZCP Fellowship.

The CCA-MPR was held in March and September 2024, with the QLD program achieving a 100% pass rate in both rounds. A total of 31 assessments were completed during these rounds in 2024. The CCA relies on longitudinal data points to make high-stakes decisions, unlike summative assessments, which base judgments on a single data point. The ongoing, structured feedback received during training is assessed to inform progression decisions. This ensures that candidates only proceed to submit their portfolios when they believe they have met the required standards. As a result, the outcomes from the CCA do not come as a surprise to candidates.

3.5 Psychotherapy Written Case (PWC)

The results of the Psychotherapy Written Case (PWC) submissions received in 2024 are summarised in Tables 13 to 16, including the pass rates. In total, 56 submissions were assessed. The pass rates for the PWC in 2024 were as follows: 65% in February, 56% in May, 100% in August and 73% in November 2024.

5. Specialist International Medical Graduates numbers

Overall, the QLD program currently has 18 active SIMGs across each comparability status. Overall, 14 SIMGs (78%) are undertaking the program under the Partial Comparability pathway, and 4 SIMGs (22%) under Substantial Comparability. Table 32 shows the total number of people currently enrolled in Certificates of Advanced Training in QLD, and the details of Membership by location are shown in Table 33. A total of 185 advanced certificates are being completed by 174 people, with the most common certificates being Child and Adolescent and Addiction, accounting for 46% of the total. The majority of enrolled individuals are RANZCP trainees (57%), and the remaining are Fellows (43%).

8. Specialist Training Program (STP)

The Specialist Training Program (STP) is an Australian Government initiative.

It provides funding to health organisations to support specialist medical training in settings beyond traditional public teaching hospitals. STP posts involve 6-month training rotations in priority settings, such as the private sector, regional, rural, and remote areas, as well as non-hospital settings (e.g., aged care, community health organisations, or Aboriginal medical services). As providers of STP, posts must submit a report after each rotation. The numbers in this report may differ from those reported to the Department of Health and Aged Care. The Modified Monash (MM) classification is used to report the geographical location of the posts.

Table 35 shows the total number of FTE by the MM rating, and the number of QLD trainees in the STP program is shown in Table 36. The STP program funded in QLD a total of 41 FTE across the MM locations during rotation 1, 2024, covered by 33 trainees.

9. Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) Program

The Integrated Rural Training Pipeline (IRTP) program is an Australian Government initiative designed to increase the number of psychiatry trainees and specialists in rural and regional areas.

Training posts funded in the IRTP program differ from those in the Specialist Training Program (STP) in that the funding follows the trainee through multiple rotations at a health service.

Overall, the College has 36 active trainees funded by the IRTP program. Currently, there are eight trainees from QLD funded by the IRTP.
