


Military and Veterans' Psychiatry Training Program Resource Booklet



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The Military and Veterans'
Psychiatry Training Program
(MVPTP) seeks to improve
access to psychiatrists with
training in military and veteran
mental health, through its
objective to fund ten military
and veteran psychiatry registrar
training positions.

The program is funded by a grant provided by the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) to the Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Psychiatrists. Training in an MVPTP funded post is for a standard 6-month rotation, you may be offered the opportunity to stay in the post for 2 rotations after which you will move to other opportunities.

MVPTP posts are only open to current RANZCP trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates (SIMGs) on the pathway to RANZCP Fellowship.



The aims of the MVPTP

- Enhance the capacity of the health care sector to provide high quality training opportunities
- Facilitate the required educational experiences for specialists in training
- Support high quality training posts to build the overall training capacity in the system
- Contribute to improving the medical workforce distribution

MVPTP Posts

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Training in a MVPTP post is for a standard 6-month rotation, you may be offered the opportunity to stay in the post for 2 rotations after which you will move to other opportunities.

The program is governed through the Military and Veterans' Psychiatry Training Program Guidelines for Health Services.

MVPTP posts are only open to current Royal Australian and New Zealand College of Physiatrists (RANZCP) trainees and Specialist International Medical Graduates (SIMGs) on the pathway to RANZCP Fellowship.
